#### **Objectives of the Course**

The main objectives of the course are as follows: - To provide students with an awareness of the notions of "translation" and "translator" based on real life, - To develop an awareness concerning the proper use of







Turkish in the translation process, which means producing a text that can exist in the Turkish target language and cultural system by its own within the context of translations from English into Turkish; to contribute to such skills of students through translation practices, - To enhance students? awareness of the relationship between translation and culture; to raise their consciousness of the roles they can play in "intercultural communication" as an "expert". - To improve students' consciousness and competence regarding "text production/writing" in general.

#### Contents of the Course

Students are first requested to examine real-life examples of translation with a focus on the notions of "translation" and "translator". Then discussions are held based on such examination. The course has two main stages. The first one is "Turkish for Translators". This stage involves some reading and examination of real-life translation examples in order to illustrate the importance of proper use of Turkish by translators in the translation process, which means producing a text that can exist in the Turkish target language and cultural system by its own when the language pair is taken as English-Turkish for translation. Departing from such reading and examination, English to Turkish translation practices are carried out at sentence-level. The second stage is "Intercultural Communication". This stage involves some reading that contains cultural differences and intercultural encounters in order to exemplify the roles translators play as "intercultural communication experts". In line with such reading, translation practices involving examples of roles played by translators as "communication experts" are performed.



The structure of this course is historically based, arranged as a genealogy of theoretical paradigms, beginning in the early 20th century - when literary theory first developed as a formal discipline - and following the evolution of literary theory into the present day. From text-centric Russian formalism to contemporary gynocriticism and trauma theory, you will explore the basic principles and preeminent texts that have defined many of the major critical debates surrounding literature over the past hundred years.

It also aims to demonstrate the development taking place in the field of literary criticism, making references to various literary theorists ranging from period of Aristotle to the age of Enlightenment.to investigate the human condition to think critically and with understanding about written and filmed media to broaden and deepen the ability to write effectively in academic and professional settings and for personal growth to practice the forms professional writers use and learn the technology needed to make writing a profession to reflect on ethical and philosophical issues raised whenever one reads a creative, explanatory, or persuasive text to engage in creative thought, in collaboration with other students, thus generating new possibilities for thinking, dreaming, and challenging structures in society.

#### Contents of the Course

In this course, the theoretical approaches of Socrates, Aristotle, Horace, and Longinus are studied and works of art associated with Classical Period are analyzed and these analyses are supplemented with students' presentations. Medieval concept of literature is discussed, and literary theories are assessed in relation to vigorous accusations leveled against literary and artistic initiatives in the Medieval period. The relationship between Classical Humanism and literary criticism is treated in the process of the formation of the Renaissance in Europe. The students will be encouraged to get involved in processes through which they can make their own decisions, construct, and reconstruct their own set of beliefs and practices in relation to language teaching.

Objectives of the	Course					

The aim of this course is to introduce students to concepts and issues in sociolinguistics which are relevant to their lives as prospective language teachers. By the end of the course participants will gain an understanding of basic sociolinguistic concepts. They will be able to explore and evaluate critically sociolinguistic issues relevant to language teaching.

#### Contents of the Course

Sociolinguistics examines the relationship between language and society, focusing on both learning about linguistic matters and learning about social structures. The course combines topics from two theoretical and research fields: (1) sociolinguistics, which examines the relationship between language and society, sometimes focusing more on learning about linguistic matters and sometimes more on learning about social structures (2) language teaching, which includes the examination of what happens in the classroom with teachers and learners, and also how these practices relate to the broader socio-political context in which the teaching and learning take place.
